It was reported in the meeting minutes from last month that a new program was being offered at the American Museum of Science and Energy. OLD BUSINESS

The first order of old business was the Air Show that was held on Sept. 14, 2002 at the Club field. Everything went really well with the show, even though it looked like we were going to be rained out. It stopped raining about 1 1/2 hours before the show and the clouds parted, giving us partly cloudy skies. There was a loss of aircraft, mainly before the show. (More on that later) We were supposed to have a full scale CAP come by and perform some aerobatics over our field, however the cloud cover and low ceiling prevented this from happening. We had a pretty good turn out, in spite of the threat of rain. There were a lot of favorable comments made by the spectators and everybody had a good time. The guys and gal(s) working the concession stand did a wonderful job; they sold a lot of hot dogs! A big thank you to all the members that helped before, during and after the show. Someone asked when we if we could schedule another one. The answer was, "Why not ?!? "

In a related item, there was some "talk" on the e-mail about someone "sacrificing" an airplane for the good of the Club. We had a member take his plane up and test the ceiling before the air show, and unfortunately, the plane didn't make it back to the runway. It was suggested that the Club make a contribution to replacing the plane. After a short discussion among the members, it was decided to reimburse the member for the plane.

The next item of old business discussed was the Cross Country meet(s) were being held at the field. It was reported that we are all done with them for this year. They had been doing them on the "spur of the moment", calling and saying they are going to have a track meet today, can we get the field. So it was decided that we should get some advance notice so we can prevent a conflict in case we have a contest.



Well, the Float Fly was held on schedule on September 28th at Fred Heddleson's place in Kingston. I didn't have time to report on it in the October issue but I can tell you now that it was as much (or more) fun as the previous one held off Guinn Road. Fred has a beautiful site for a float fly; it is shady, facing the west (which means the sun is not in your eyes), with a nice dock, and a good bank to set the models in the water and retrieve them. Fred was also a perfect host, along with his daughter Janet Allen, who furnished coffee and donuts to the early arrivals. I have to say that I got confused by the map and had trouble finding the place, but it was worth it when I did. Jamie Evans was flying his Hanger 9 ¼ scale CAP ARF doing 4 point rolls, a split S and some other things. And he went up about 100 feet and put the plane in a spin, then it went into a negative spin and it never recovered. A search party went out to look for the plane. Jordan Foley spotted the plane hanging upside down in a tree just inside the park entrance. The crafty bunch used a blanket to catch the plane, as Jamie's dad, Denny, climbed up the tree and shook the tree limb that was holding the plane.
