Additionally, Kevin and Evan Turner will be hosting a drone "Freedom Spec Racing" event, tentatively planned for June 25<sup>th</sup>. It does make the racing closer so pilots have to focus more on the race line paths they take. It also tends to be more affordable as less things tend to break at lower speeds and lower voltage including frames and electronics.*

### Did You Know?

One of the most famous aircraft in aviation history, the Douglas DC-3, first flew on Dec. 17<sup>th</sup>, 1935. It

was originally called the Douglas Sleeper Transport (DST) because it was designed for American Airlines, which wanted a wider version of the DC-2 that could accommodate bunks for sleeping on long flights. DC-3 was the designation given to the version of the plane that had seats rather than bunks.



More than 16,000 DC-3s were produced. Approximately 10,000 of those were the military variants known as the C-47 and the C-53. Production ended in 1945, although DC-3s were built under license in the Soviet Union until 1950. More than 300 DC-3s are still flying today – a testament to the design and versatility of the aircraft that made commercial aviation possible.
